

Since our inception, the Centre has grown progressively due to the support of people of goodwill, Maisha Foundation Members, and Volunteers who have selflessly offered their expertise in service to the Centre. The year 2022 presented its own set of challenges, including the ongoing Coronavirus pandemic and the sudden increase in the cost of living to alarming heights.





However, despite these challenges, we were able to provide assistance to more young mothers than ever before, with the support of people of goodwill.

In 2022, we assisted a total of 76 young mothers. Out of these, 10 were out-door mothers who were helped at home, 25 were admitted in the Centre for indoor support, and 36 were assisted online. Additionally, 2 young mothers were trained in catering, 23 in tailoring, and 2 were able to return to school. Furthermore, 37 young mothers were assisted in beauty courses to enhance their skills and opportunities for employment.

I am incredibly thankful to our benefactors, my family, and all the benevolent people who have supported our cause. Your generosity and kindness have made a significant impact in the lives of these vulnerable young mothers, providing them with hope and opportunities for a better future.



As we look forward to the future, I appeal to all people of goodwill to join us in this noble cause.

Something else alarmed her: the number of women who had to perform clandestine abortions, due to the lack of resources they had to support their children.


"Mama Domitila" decided to contribute with what littles he had. She started cutting out papers with her phone number and posted them throughout Kibera, hoping that women n need of a shoulder to lean on could turn to her. **This is how Edel Quinn Center was born, which was destined to pregnancy crisis and accompaniment of women.**




In 2015, a small group of Chilean volunteers from a low-income hospital in Kenya came across this small, but great, local initiative; which had become a place of light and life for women involved in very adverse environments. They were also extremely moved by the reality of thousands of African women who could not welcome their children in a dignified way. They asked themselves, how can we give them real support?

After this experience, they decided to commit to these women and become a true support network. Thus, in partnership with the Edel Quinn Center, Maisha was created. Maisha, which in Swahili means LIFE, shared the dream of welcoming and supporting mothers and their children in Kibera.

Today, Maisha is a network of more than 60 people focused on providing support to women and their families, united in the dream of continuing to expand this work in Kenya, Chile, and other countries around the world.

IIn Kenya there is no free access to healthcare services, which could be the reason why only 40% of births occur within hospitals (Carrera JM et al, 2007).


When examining the figures, the situation is alarming. The maternal mortality rate is 377 per 100,000 live births, whereas in Chile, the number does not exceed 10 women (World Bank, 2020).

3rd country with the highest number of teenage mothers worldwide

Around 13,000 Kenyan young women drop out of school each year due to unplanned pregnancies, reaching a figure of 21% teenage pregnancies in the country.

According to the latest pregnancy report from the Health Ministry (Health Ministry, 2021), Kenya would be the third country with the highest number of teenage mothers world wide.

In Kenya, very high rates of clandestine abortions have been observed, being this the main cause of maternal morbidity and mortality in the country

According to a study carried out in 2012, there were 464,690 cases of induced abortions, corresponding to 30 abortions per 100 births that year(Ministry of Health, Kenya, 2013)..

The limited accessibility of health systems makes it difficult for women to receive treatment in case of illness, but also deprives them of their right to receive health education, health promotion, and disease prevention.

There are only 9,7 health workers, including doctors, nurses, and midwives, for every 10,000 patients (World Health Organization; 2014).



Through our health program, we ensure our mothers and their children receive adequate healthcare before, during, and after childbirth.

We offer prenatal check-ups, delivery care, and breastfeeding counseling. We perform a continuous follow-up of mothers and newborns through home visits.

We educate and train local health personnel to improve competencies in the community itself.



Sexual and Affective Education



We support children, adolescents, and young people in different stages of development, under a personal perspective of their affectivity and sexuality.

We work in collaboration with the international Teen STAR program, which trains our volunteers to work on issues related to the physical, psychological, emotional, intellectual, and spiritual dimensions of the person.

We develop decision-making skills based on freedom and responsibility. We train local monitors from Kibera so they can continue replicating the program on an ongoing basis in Kenya.



Sexual and Affective Education



Menstruation without Rules

As part of our sexual and affective education program, we have the "Menstruation Without Rules" initiative to guarantee menstrual hygiene supplies. We work to make menstruation no longer an impediment, but instead to ensure that it is informed, environmentally friendly, and accessible.

Menstruation continues to be a problem

for many girls, adolescents, and adults who do not have the basic supplies needed for this period. It is also one of the main reasons for school absenteeism in Kenya.

Each delivery is accompanied by an educational workshop on the menstrual cycle and feminine hygiene recommendations.



Sustainability



Through the sustainability program, we empower mothers with tools that enable them to support their families autonomously and safely.

We provide them with technical skills, saving strategies, and the opportunity to explore income-generating activities. In addition, we encourage personaland professional development by promoting recreational and educational opportunities, allowing them to broaden their horizons and increase their confidence and self-esteem.

Finally, we seek to provide them with the knowledge they need to achieve their goals.

We know how important it is to put a face on the work we do. Without a doubt, the heart of our project are the Maisha Mothers, and our sex education students. They move, inspire, and motivate us every day to continue working for this cause.



My name is Faith, I'm a Maisha Mother.

Being part of the Maisha family is a great experience, for me, it taught me how to live with people from different places and I learned we are very different. And we are one family expected to love and respect each other.

The volunteers are the best. Taking care of us and ensuring we are at our best state. They are full of love and it was very easy to interact and talk to them about issues disturbing the mind. They understand the pregnancy journey and its pressure, so they make sure to be there when we need them.

The midwives are so good when it comes to doing their jobs. They teach us what we're supposed to know about pregnancy and what we should do and not to do. They make sure our food is balanced for the sake of the babies.

When my time for delivery came, the midwife - Katerina, was there every second until my baby was in my arms. She would tell me what's going on and would make sure my baby was okay. She was very patient with me and loving. She understood the pain I had and she walked with me every step. She would take videos of me during labor for memories. She would make me laugh to forget the pain.

Unfortunately, my baby had to go to the newborn unit. The volunteers couldn't come to the hospital so they always made me feel I'm not alone by assuring me everything is going to be okay. They would bring what I needed at the hospital. The midwives would come and check on my baby frequently until it was time to go home.

When I went back to the home, they showed me how strong I am and how happy they are I was out of the hospital. It made me feel super strong. They would check on my baby even after going back to my home. I know I have a family in Maisha. It's a home where I'm always welcome.

My name is Corazon Ong'ayo,

I'm a teacher at Grace Humanitas Educational Centre, where the Maisha Foundation has been distributing the reusable pads for the past 3 years.

It has been of help to our girls in school because it has reduced absenteeism where by most of our girls used to miss classes due to lack of sanitary pads that their parents did not have money to buy for them.

It has reduced stigmatisation among our girls whereby you find a girl staining herself and others laugh at her, this used to reduce her self esteem.




I can say the pads program has created self esteem among girls. It has also reduce a burden to parents because it is reusable, compared to other pads where you find that you have to buy every month 1 or 2 packages, but these, once you have, you use, you clean them for you

to use them another time.

Lastly, it has made our girls responsible because they have to ensure that the reusable pads are clean. So it forces them to clean and dry them, and keep them safe for you to use it another time. Thanks to the Maisha community for the reusable pads.

My name is Lavender Gracious,

I'm 21 years old and a mother of a girl named Naya. Now I'm glad to say I'm a Maisha beneficiary. I've stayed in the Maisha home since august 2021, then I delivered my baby in september and then I stayed in Maisha for one and a half months after delivery, then I was released to go home.


But Maisha is always helping me and other girls, even as we are at our homes. Maisha has taught me to make reusable sanitary pads that are helping me and other girls who are unprivileged out there on menstruation periods.

For the pads we use a cotton Kitenge, linen inside and a nylon waterproof fabric. We use only that, we make them, it is very easy, and because of the production we get a pay. For example, I've benefited a lot from making the pads and I also use them. And they are also distributed in schools for girls that they can not afford pads and they distribute them like charity and we receive them with love from the distributors. We are happy to have very good people who are helping us as women here in Kenya, in Kibera at large. It is important to keep going with the sanitary pads. I can say since the project stopped we have been having many cases of girls not being able to afford the pads and they can end up in bad situations. Like you can hear a girl doesn't have pads and then they can not go to school because of the lack of pads. And we, who make them for payment we also are suffering Kidogo, its like our job so when the project stops, we stop job and no payment. So we are praying and hoping that a caregiver and a care person can boost us and the project so that we can continue.

The project has helped me because nowadays I do not spend much on pads because the pads I have been given for free. And also the payment has helped me a lot, now for example I pay my house rent and I cater for my babies diapers and clothes and others things for myself too.

Before I was using a piece of cloth during my menstrual period, I didn't have anything else. But then good people came and showed me how to use a reusable sanitary pad. Now, finally I know how to use them and also I can prevent infections. Maisha helped me to know more about myself, being confident and not feeling shy because of my period. Thanks to the people donating sanitary pads, I would like to ask them to continue sending them please because they are very helpful **(Janet Okinyi)**

Let me talk about the garbage. There is less garbage since we received our reusable sanitary pads. When you are done using them, you can wash them and reuse them again. There was lots of garbage since every girl used more than 5 in their menstrual period. Some girls used to throw some garbage even along this road and this brought a dirty environment and caused diseases that hurt human beings. Thanks to the people in the project for empowering girls and being for girls who come from poor grounds by helping them with pads. (Florence Anyango)

Maisha and the Teen STAR program has helped me when I'm stuck in different ways. They are encouraging us to know and to understand what is going on with our bodys in menstrual cycles. **(Wendy Achieng')** Experiencing Africa and Maisha from the inside is something that impacts you forever. This is why many of our volunteers and team members wanted to share their testimony with you.





I had always wanted my work to be useful, to mean something to someone. In a personal search, I learned about Domitila's story and the work she does with the Maisha Foundation. What stood out to me the most was that the emphasis was put in delivering tools, and not just providing a service.

In a little more than a year, time that I was in Kenya, I was able to experience, how through accompaniment, understanding, and educating, the destiny of a person can be changed.

From my role in the health program, it was revealing to see how something as simple as being there for another person can change everything. I met brave women

and girls who taught me that one is capable of everything, just by wanting it. Origin

You enter and your feet are submerged in the mud that overflows and leaves you glued to the surface, warning you that you are already inserted. You walk and you begin to smell the garbage that is imposed on hills and soils. Screams, tears, sales, songs and the train passing in the midst of the chaos that is experienced every day. You look up a bit and, between the rain and the wind, thousands of zinc roofs lean out over one of the largest, poorest, and most marginal slums in the world. This is the origin of the Maisha mothers. An adverse origin, with a crude past, tinged with inequalities, injustices, violence of all kinds, and often drug trafficking. It hurts. It hurts to think, feel, and live –even for a few moments- this reality, which over the years never ceases to amaze me and stir my head, heart, and stomach.I walk through the rain and the crowd, looking for the corridor that, with some planks, allows us to cross into a small dark room in which 9 people live, sharing a floor and a mattress.

They greet me with a warm hug that makes me forget that I'm already wet. They notice, and a member of the family takes off her vest and covers my back. When the mother of the house sees me, she runs out and returns a few minutes later with a bag of milk and a packetof tea that the businesson the corner gave her.

They light the coal and the room fills with smoke. In a second, they make me feel part of them and we start laughing and talking about life. The mother sits by the fire, heats the chai (tea) and turns to me with an anguished face. She brings me closer to her daughter, Yvonne, and tell me that an uncle abused her until she got pregnant. At first, fear seized this innocent girl. She wanted to abort, tried to do so illegally, and was unsuccessful. Then, she began to accept the pregnancy, until finally decided she wanted to have her child. She felt lonely and scared to walk around Kibera assuming her new reality: being 13 years old and having the father and head of the family telling her she must leave home. Her mother met Maisha through a neighbor, and asked us to accept her in the foundation. After that afternoon of conversation and being incorporated into the program, they cried with emotion, hugged each other and prayed gratefully. The girl grabs her belongings, ready to go to Maisha's "home".

In a small bag, she carries her pregnancy control card, a T-shirt, and underwear... That is everything she has... But in her heart she carries hope, confidence, and immense love, with which she decides to continue her pregnancy and have her child.

Midwife Nurse Operation Coordinator 2021-2022 The first thing I saw when I entered the foster house was the mural where handprints of each mother who has been through Maisha are. I froze. Suddenly, a tremendous fear came over me, the kind that immobilizes you. Because at that moment, I realized the tremendous responsibility and honor that they had entrusted me: to be part of something as big as Maisha. I felt the same fear I felt when decided to travel to Kenya, to cross to the other side of the world, with an open heart to everything and everyone who crossed my path. I tried to count each hand engraved on that mural, but it was impossible: there were too many. After a few seconds, I understood that each one of those hands represented 2 people: a Maisha Mother and her baby. Each one had a unique story, a family, and dreams. When I applied for Maisha, a 23-year-old kinesiology graduate, I was eager to go and apply everything I learned during my career. But life is wise, and it gives you the challenges that you have to go through in a precise moment of your life.



I went exactly where I had to: to Maisha and its housing program. It was a challenging job, at times even painful, but tremendously fulfilling.

Receiving and welcoming each Maisha mother, listening to their stories, reaching a level of intimacy where they entrusted me with their experiences, their joys, and their sorrows. Their dreams and also their biggest fears. Suddenly, I had crossed all the cultural barriers: language, race, etc. None of that mattered anymore. At that moment, we were completely different women, but so similar at the same time, laughing and crying together. Because that's what it's all about: listening, empathizing, and understanding what the needs of each one of them are.

After a few monthsof a lot of learning, I was readyto prepare my kinesiology workshop. I did 4 classes on psychomotor development in the first year of life and on the importance of early stimulation in newborns. This was a tremendous challenge, since they had no idea what I was talking about. But that didn't matter, because their desireto learn was huge, and even more since it had to do with the health of theirsons and daughters. It was a tremendously enriching instance! I can't explainin words whatI felt whenI got home and saw some moms were doing the exercises that I had taught them the day before.



The love that the Maisha moms gave me, what my dear and wise Domitila taught me, and the support of the team, who became my family in Kenya, is not something that can be explained: it is something that has to be live to understand.

Meeting the Maisha moms has been the most inspiring thing I've ever experienced. Women who have been victims of so many injustices have taken this suffering as an engine for change, becoming excellent mothers and people. For me, they are an example of life. They taught me the value of a smile, that every minute counts, and above all, to be thankful that I am alive. I will be forever grateful, a part of my heart stayed in Africa, with them, forever. A part full of hope.

It's just that getting to Kibera is getting to streets full of garbage, covered with many greetings from children and not so children - who approach nervous and happy, shouting and calling their friends to come shake your hand too. It's looking eye to eye, and hugging just because. Here it is impossible not to greet, not to hug,

not to love.

- It is the only place where, despite the lack of basic services of any kind, there is an overdose of love, resilience, and smiles. And garbage, odors, and mistreatment.
- Kibera is an absolutecontrast of endlessalleys. Of infinitestories. And with Maisha, I learned to look at both sides.I learned thatI am because we are,I learned thatyou can changethe world onesmile at a time. Kiberais a constant welcome hug, and it is also a cry for help. A request for help frompoverty, fear, and abuse. It'sgetting raped because you went to buy water. It's prostituting yourself for food. It's seeing girls live in an unfair world, and yet have the biggest hearts in the world. It's having to cross rivers of garbage to get home. It is to dance in the street. It is knowingyour neighbor, and your neighbor's neighbor. In Kibera, you learn how it feels to be alive, and what to live for.

It is still difficult for me to describe in words what Kenya is like, what Kibera is like, what the Maisha moms are like, and what our dear Domtila is like.

I remember very well the first time I saw the Maisha Mothers. Shy, nervous, they showed little affection, were women of few words. But after a few days, they began to give you all their love, open up, and tell their tremendous life stories. Very hard lives and much suffering, which are not consistent with the desire they have to live, the joy they show every day, the fellowship and sisterhood that is seen between them in our "home", and the total dedication as mothers to their children.

It is admirable to see how they they overcome adversity, how they learn to be mothers by teaching each other and observing the others who are having their babies first, and setting an example for the others. They arrive at the house shy and helpless, and leave there a few weeks postpartum fully empowered and having experienced great growth during the months of their stay. I am privileged to have been able to accompany some women in this process of becoming mothers. I thought they could've looked at us strangely for being "mzungus" (white) and that it is something that we had to hear on a daily basis from the smiling faces of the children. But it is an expression that they tell you with affection, with a smile on their face, and with the interest of being able to talk and get to know you. Despite the shortcomings that exist in Kenya, people are very welcoming, very open to show what they have and what they do.

We returned with a full heart, and looking at things with different eyes. WWhat for us is very simpleand taken for granted, for many Kenyan women is an unattainable privilege. They taught me to live in the present, to value the smallest things, and to have another perspective on the circumstances.

I was privileged to have been able to meet and work as a volunteer at the Maisha Foundation, which does an incredible job of helping women with their pregnancies. All my admiration for Maisha's volunteers and coordinators, and thank you very much for the tremendous opportunity to have been able to contribute a grain of sand there. Undoubtedly, the most benefited are the volunteers.


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



2022 INCOME \$94.632 total USD






2022 EXPENSES \$94.680 total USD


